Our History and Activities

In the summer of 1976, a group of Iranian ladies residing in Los Angeles founded the Iranian Jewish Women's Organization. The mission of this organization was established around the need for adjustment of the Iranian Jewish Community to their new homeland, as well as the preservation of their Jewish and Iranian heritage. This organization's roots were established in Iran in 1979 thru the effort of a group women seeking to improve the standard of life for women and children. For more than thirty years the mission of these women was accomplished by activities such as assisting WWII refugees, the establishment of day care centers in many Iranian cities and literacy classes.

Since 1976. The Iranian Jewish Women's Organization's activities have varied as the Iranian community has grown and become established in Los Angeles. As we continue to grow and change as women and as a community, inevitably there will be a need for the continued enhancement of the image of Iranian women through intellectual, social, cultural, and charitable activities. The highlights of these activities include, financial aid to needy people, grants and loans to local students, annual contributions to Hebrew University for academic research and scholarships to selected Iranian students. The celebration and promotion of traditional Iranian and Jewish holidays, the annual selection and presentation of The Mother and Women Of The Year and significant financial contributions and involvement to the Yitzhak Rabin Hillel Center for Jewish Life at UCLA.
